ALYSON DENETTE

Alyson has been weaving and spinning for 14 years. She has been a Fiber Judge for the Big E, the Massachusetts State Fair, along with judging the fiber events at numerous local fairs. She has taught knitting and weaving classes for the past 6 years, and has had original woven designs published by Handwoven magazine. For several years Alyson did custom sewing and hand work, including wedding dresses and bridal attire. She is the former owner of the Textile Traditions store in Chicopee, Massachusetts. Currently, Alyson and her children live in Granby, Massachusetts on her parent's llama farm.

C. NORMAN EVANS, DVM

C. Norman Evans completed his undergraduate work from The University of Kentucky in 1964 and his DVM from Auburn University in 1968. In 1970 he started a veterinary practice in Madisonville, Kentucky. He has served on the board of the KY Veterinary Medical Association and various other veterinary associations while in his group practice. In 1986 Dr. Evans became interested in camelid veterinary medicine. In 1992 he left the four person practice which he had begun in 1970. His camelid practice now commands about 90% of his time. His Kentucky based mobile practice, LAMA Wellness Service, enables him to work in numerous states each year with alpacas and llamas. LAMA Wellness Service maintains a plasma bank and ships to much of the eastern United States. The practice provides nutritional servies as well as llama and alpaca supplements. His chief interest lies in camelid reproduction, blood profiles, and nutritiontional analysis as it relates to herd wellness. LAMA Wellness Service regularly consults with both breeders and lama veterinarians on such topics as problem breeders and solutions to field problems. His veterinary seminars for owners and breeders are based on his sixteen years of work as a practicing camelid veterinarian. Notes from his seminars were published as Veterinary Lama Field Manual in early 1998.

PHIL FEINER

Phil, along with his partner Larry Rothenberg, own and operate Maple Hill Farms in Stephentown, NY. Maple Hill Farms is home to 48 Llamas and 2 Suri Alpacas. Phil has been involved in showing Llamas for a number of years now, and is the Superintendent of the Northeast Llama Showcase in West Springfield, MA. The Showcase is brought to you by both Phil and his partner Jane Grillo. In addition to the Showcase, Phil is the Superintendent for the ALSA Eastern Regional as well as serving as a Director and Treasurer on the Board of GALA.

WILLIAM FRANKLIN, PhD

Dr. William Franklin has a Ph.D. in wildlife Biology and is a former Professor in the Department of Animal Ecology, College of Agriculture, Iowa State University. Dr. Franklin is renowned for his research and work in the southern Patagonia of Chile. His research specialties include large mammal population and behavioral ecology. He is an expect on South American Wild Camelids. Dr. Franklin's 30 years of research of guanaco behavioral ecology and population biology has been published widely in scientific journals, in popular literature, as well as featured in numerous television specials. During his field studies to the Falkland Islands he has been responsible for overseeing population surveys and baby guanaco capture. His research on using llamas as guard animals to protect sheep from predators drew much attention from both inside and outside of the llama community. He has compiled ongoing research statistics for over ten years. Currently Dr. Franklin operates Hidden Corners Inc, an Adventure Travel and Research Center based in Concord, Massachusetts. Hidden Corners Inc. is dedicated to exploring unique and remote ecosystems and cultures around the globe through adventure travel. Participants during 2001 have had the chance to work with teams of international scientists conducting field studies on the natural history of the Mongolian wildlife, Falkland guanacos, and coral reef fish in Belize.

VIV FULTON

Viv and her husband Bob have owned llamas at Rhodie Hill Farm in Sherburne, NY since 1985 and now have one of the larger herds in the state. Founding members of GALA and NYLAA, she has served for many years on the Boards of each. In 1996, she left the pharmaceutical research world after 23 years to concentrate on llamas and sheep. Interested in rekindling the fun of packing with llamas, Viv & Bob organized GALA's first llama trek in 1987. She also completed the Pack Llama Trial Association's Certification Course at PLTA's Pack Llama Rendezvous near Boise, Idaho in 1998. Since then she has certified both basic and advance level trials out of state and has hosted the same in her home area. Recognizing the need for basic llama packing instruction, they teach workshops at their farm for others interested in learning about packing with llamas.

ISABEL KREBS

Isabel has been knitting for over fifty years and spinning and weaving for ten years. Retirement from teaching has given her time to indulge her fiber hobbies and to acquire a spinning herd of five llamas. In the summer she is a demonstration weaver at the Hancock Shaker Village and helps with wool displays at several llama events. In the winter she teaches spinning, weaving and needle felting and catches up with her own rug weaving projects. She lives with her husband Neil at Glendouglas Farm, their tree farm where the llamas are learning to pack.

PAIGE MCGRATH

Paige is the manager of her parents' farm, Lower Sherwood, in Charlottesville, Virginia, where they have been raising llamas since 1986. She has 20 years of show experience starting with horses in 1981 and llamas in 1988. Lower Sherwood Farm has produced over 25 champions to date. Paige created and financed the first "stand alone" llama show in the country in 1994. Formerly known as the *Autumn Classic*, *The Virginia Classic* has been a successful ALSA-sanctioned Level III show that has grown 10-20 percent every year since its inception. Currently, she is the vice president of ALSA where she is serving her second term on the board of directors. She also is a Director-at-Large for the GALA Board. Additionally, Paige publishes Llama Life II news magazine along with her mother, Jo Ann, who serves as editor.

SANDY and MARC PAGE

Sandy and Marc live in Petersham, Massachusetts where they maintain a herd of 20 Ilamas at Sputtermill Ranch. In their non-llama lives, Sandy has been in education for over 25 year, working as both a middle school special education teacher and a special education counselor. Marc has a degree in human services and is currently employed as a job developer for disabled adults.
